Joining the Association

When paying your dues, please consider a donation for the Native Community Garden. The funds are used to buy native plants and amendments to the soil as non-native invasive plants are removed and replaced with native plants.

Department of Public Works Representatives

Raquel Robbins (<u>raquel.robbins@baltimorecity.gov</u>) and Lakeisha Laury (<u>lakeisha.laury@baltimorecity.gov</u>) are the new DPW representatives for our district. Contact either Ms. Robbins or Ms. Laury if you have any questions or requests about DPW tasks, which include collection of trash and recyclables, street sweeping, water and sewer issues, and street repair after work performed by DPW. They spoke at our annual meeting and stressed that reporting any issues in the neighborhood to 311 first is the most efficient way to get requests routed to the correct agency and addressed promptly.

Neighborhood Representatives Wanted

There are a number of ongoing activities that the Association is involved in. For many years a handful of residents have consistently participated in the activities. But they want a break, and it is necessary to recruit new residents to fulfill the roles. The following roles are requested:

City Meetings

At least three residents who are able to represent the community at two city meetings. We are looking for multiple people so that they can rotate attendance. The meetings are tasks are:

- Commander's Meetings of the Baltimore City Police Department's Northern District (ND)
 - Attend the monthly Commander's Meetings, held on the second Wednesday of each month from 7pm to 8/8:30pm, usually at the ND Headquarters at 2201 W Cold Spring Ln. Currently, these meetings are hybrid in-person and Zoom, but inperson attendance is encouraged. The purpose of these meetings is to keep the community

informed of the events and activities going on in the Department and the ND. Crime statistics and trends are discussed.

- Bring up any issues that Lake Evesham residents or community association officers have raised.
- Prepare a written summary of the discussion, with emphasis on what is of special interest to the residents of the Lake Evesham community.
- Post the notes on NextDoor in a timely manner.
- Northern District Community Relations Council Meetings
 - At this time, it is not yet determined if these meetings (resuming as hybrid in August 2022) will occur every month or every other month. Is it also uncertain what week and day of the month they will take place. The ND CRC president, Christopher Forrest, will work with the ND officers to set a schedule. These meetings are run by the community and deal more specifically with community concerns.
 - Responsibilities:
 - Bring up any issues that Lake Evesham residents or community association officers have raised.
 - Prepare a written summary of the discussion, with emphasis on what is of special interest to the residents of the Lake Evesham community.
 - Post the notes on NextDoor in a timely manner.

Community Native Pollinator Garden



Our neighborhood is home to a Native Pollinator Garden. Where was once a garden installed by the State of Maryland approximately 22 years ago has been transformed over the past 7 years. The Garden is now home to a variety of native plants to attract and provide food and shelter for native bees, birds, butterflies, specifically the monarch and swallow tail and most recently a bunny has taken up residence. The Garden does not permit the use of any pesticides. The Garden is located on the northwest corner of York Road and Northern Parkway, adjacent to two very busy transit stops. Since its inception, Theresa Furnari has worked in the garden and led groups to maintain the garden during periods in the year. The latest work was completed on November 12, 2022, when members of the Loyola Swim Team removed invasive shrubs, grasses, and pruned evergreen trees. David Barrett, a master gardener who lives in Homeland will continue to work in the garden and provide his expertise as a master gardener.



With Theresa's departure, the neighborhood needs to have a resident who can take on the role of assisting Mr. Barrett, representing the community and participating in events at the garden.
